

CIRCUMNAVIGATING THE PACIFIC: THE UNITED STATES AND THE PHILIPPINES, 1898-1945

2009 ASLH Panel Proposal

Breaking out of transatlantic paradigms, this panel will consider sociolegal exchange between the United States and the Philippines. Presentations will highlight the multidirectional nature of this understudied circuit. Turning the tables on studies of US hegemony abroad, Nancy Buenger will consider the blowback from US expansion in the metropole, focusing on intertwined Progressive “home rule” campaigns in Chicago and the Philippines that fostered equity jurisprudence. Leah Castañeda offers a Pacific retelling of the American Revolution in the rise of the all-Filipino Philippine Assembly and its contests with the US-dominated Philippine Commission. Examining the 1945 adjudication of war crimes and collaboration in Manila, Christopher Capozzola links post-World War II transitional justice to trans-Pacific debates about imperialism and decolonization. The panel will appeal to Latin American, Asian, and US specialists, as well as those with a general interest in transnational and colonial studies.

HOME RULE: EQUITABLE JUSTICE IN CHICAGO AND THE PHILIPPINES, 1898-1917
Nancy Buenger, PhD Candidate, University of Chicago

As a University of Chicago historian noted in 1906, “the administration of colonial possessions has in due time affected the legislation, the morals, the tendencies and the character of every nation owning them.”¹ Turning the tables on studies of US hegemony abroad, this presentation will consider the blowback from US expansion in the metropole, focusing on intertwined Progressive “home rule” campaigns in Chicago and the Philippines that fostered equity jurisprudence. Restoring Pacific crossings to their Progressive era prominence, it will illuminate the colonial and religious underpinnings of US court reconstruction.

An ambiguous slogan loaded with irreconcilable interests, home rule ostensibly promised local self-governance. Debates over the legal capacity of dependents were central to home rule, and juryless equity procedure was a common solution for governing populations with differential legal rights. A Roman Catholic legal heritage and a lingua franca in the Americas, equity historically embodied differential legal treatment for *miserabiles*—the weak or needy exempted from the king’s justice—in summary court proceedings. A loosely defined and ever-growing population, Progressive *miserabiles* included women, juveniles, the feeble-minded, Indians, Filipinos, and those in need of moral guidance. Allegedly confined to civil disputes, equity’s jurisdiction included criminal affairs in urban and insular courts.

Home rule intersected on several planes in Chicago and the Philippines, a fertile seedbed for civil governor William Howard Taft’s early judicial experiments. Commissioned by Taft, Chicago Columbiad architect Daniel Burnham platted the spatial dimensions of metropolitan governance in the Philippines before drafting his influential plan for Chicago. In addition to Chicago political and cultural ambassadors who voyaged the Pacific, mainland activists compared colonial and municipal administration, including legal scholar Ernst Freund and settlement house founder Jane Addams. Although juryless insular courts sparked heated national debates, Chicagoans planned juryless municipal courts—in consultation with Taft—that were adopted nationwide. Lauding equitable Spanish and Chicago jurisprudence, Taft turned his attention to federal court reform.

A PACIFIC “QUEST FOR POWER².”

GOVERNOR GENERAL FORBES AND THE RISE OF THE PHILIPPINE ASSEMBLY, 1907-1913

Although styling themselves exceptional imperialists, Americans were not unique in tapping native leaders to help run their colonial government. Indeed, traditional imperial powers, like Great Britain and Spain, had similarly enlisted native chiefs to facilitate tax and tribute collection and indirect rule. Rather, what differentiated native participation in the Government of the Philippine Islands from earlier imperial practices were its nature, purpose, and meaning. Representative, tutelary, and consensual, these features, in turn, reflected attempts initiated by President William McKinley and his Secretary of War Elihu Root to purge colonialism of its odious associations by translating its age-old civilizing rationale into programs for colonial democracy and development that were then rendered, implemented, and legitimized through the language, categories, doctrines, and processes of the American liberal constitutional tradition. To persuade American anti-imperialists and Filipino revolutionaries to sign on to their colonial program, architects of American colonial policy thus constructed an exceptional colonialism that cohered with their own exceptional political tradition by undertaking to reproduce it.

Filipino representation, training, and consent found expression within a concrete machinery of government structured by separation of powers theory. While deemed foundational to American government, the departmental theory had to be calibrated to respond to two overriding colonial imperatives, namely, the need to maintain sovereign control as well as to accommodate Filipino incapacity and inexperience. Through three organic acts, the War Department and, later, the U.S. Congress not only divided the Government of the Philippine Islands into executive, legislative, and judicial branches, but also parceled out these departments according to race. That is, through progressive stages, the organic acts constituted the executive the domain of the American Governor-General and the legislature, that of the Filipinos legislative leaders, but reserved in the American executive all the power necessary to offset prerogatives gradually devolved to the Filipino legislature.

Focusing on the second stage of this graduated training program, this paper examines the contests between Governor General W. Cameron Forbes and the American-dominated Philippine Commission, on the one hand, and the all-Filipino Philippine Assembly, on the other. Far from reinventing colonialism, replicating in the Islands the configuration of authority that existed between Great Britain and the royal colonies of British North America resurrected in America's tropical colony the political dynamic of its pre-revolutionary past, but recast American colonial officials in the unfamiliar role of imperial antagonists, rather than popular protagonists, in this Pacific retelling of their Atlantic tradition.

A TALE OF TWO TREASONS:

ADJUDICATING WAR CRIMES AND COLLABORATION IN MANILA, 1945

Christopher Capozzola, Associate Professor of History and Lister Brothers Career Development Chair,

In the immediate aftermath of World War II, charges of collaboration and war crimes filled the air of the newly-liberated capital of the Philippines. Legal scholars have examined the trial of General Yamashita Tomoyuke—and the unsuccessful Supreme Court appeal in *Yamashita v. United States* that preceded the Japanese general's August 1945 execution—at great length. When they have done so, they have generally compared Yamashita's case—the first of the world's postwar war crimes trials—to later proceedings in Nuremberg and Tokyo.

By contrast, my paper shifts the frame of comparison, and examines the trial of General Yamashita together with the indictments of thousands of Philippine collaborators, suggesting thereby a deeper and more local context to postwar adjudication of the war's end—a context that gives us a new perspective linking post-World War II transitional justice to concurrent debates about imperialism and decolonization.

In the period leading up to the formal decolonization of the Philippines on July 4, 1946, American and Philippine authorities charged over 5,000 Filipinos with economic or political collaboration. The outcome of the collaboration trials could not have been more different from the trial of General Yamashita: war crimes trials speedily reached convictions and led to executions; the collaboration trials yielded only a handful of convictions, great ambiguity, and lasting bitterness among ordinary Filipinos.

Set for trial in a special tribunal called the Filipino People's Court, few prosecutions ever took place. Certainly, logistical obstacles and high costs hampered such an undertaking in a war-torn Southeast Asian nation. But the question of colonialism also haunted both judicial undertakings: American military authorities insisted that because the Philippines was still a U.S. colony during the war, Yamashita had committed war crimes against the United States and should be tried in a U.S. military court; State Department officials feared that insistence on U.S. sovereignty would alienate the residents of other Asian colonies—Korea, Vietnam, India, and the Dutch East Indies—at a crucial moment in world politics. Likewise, questions of sovereignty troubled the Filipino People's Courts: had collaborators committed treason against the United States? Or was Japanese invasion analogous to the American invasion of 1898? Or had collaborators sold out a nascent Filipino nation in the moment of its making?

The last decade has seen a boom of legal historical scholarship on U.S. imperialism in the Philippines, but far too little of that scholarship extends to the later years of U.S. control, or crosses the 1946 divide to address issues of postcolonial citizenship. Based on U.S., Philippine, and Japanese public records, as well as the personal papers of Douglas MacArthur and Lorenzo Tañada (the chief prosecutor of the People's Court), this paper seeks to redress that gap, and to link questions of transitional justice and war crimes to trans-Pacific debates over European, American, and Japanese imperialism.

Books

Fatal Love: Domestic Abuse, Spousal Homicide, and the Law in Colombia, Mexico and Imperial Spain, 1780-1850. A comparative history of spousal murder and battering in late colonial and early post-colonial Mexico, Colombia and Spain. Research for the book has been completed. 5 of the book's eight chapters are written. I expect to have a draft of the book in the Summer of 2009
